Naturally, I bought my kids ice cream at the end of the meal. My son stared at his for a moment and then did something I will remember the rest of my life. He picked up his sundae and, without a word, walked over and placed it in front of the woman.

With a big smile, he told her, "Here, this is for you. Ice cream is good for the soul sometimes."



## From the Reverend

What is the most difficult thing you have ever had to do? It is not usually something you have to think about. I have buried grandparents. I had to tell my father that his best friend died in a farming accident. Saying goodbye to my parents before moving to New York, was difficult, but I knew I would see them again. The most difficult thing I ever did was stand beside the bed of a child when she found out that the cancer treatments were not working. I stood there holding back my own tears while everyone else fell apart, and then discussed death with a child who would die nine days later. I don't ever want to do something that difficult again, but I know the reality of life is that I probably will.

Dying is easy, it is living that is difficult. Okay, dying was not an easy thing for Jesus. Can you imagine? Stripped of your dignity, spat upon, beaten, and crucified, naked on a Roman cross. The process of death, for Jesus, for many people is quite difficult, and in some cases, painful. But Jesus was not born just to die, because Jesus is not just anything. Jesus was born to live. Jesus was born so that we all would have the opportunity to live a life that never ends; because for those of us who are followers of the Way of the Christ, eternity begins now. There are those who fail to live in the first place. Why? Imagine all the things you could do for God if you were not afraid that you would fail. Stop sitting around and dreaming dreams, try doing something new. So what if it does not work out the first or second time, God does not put limitations upon us. How many inventors were successful the first time they attempted to make something new? Colonel Sanders (KFC) attempted his recipe 1009 times before his chicken was finally right. Thomas Edison made 10,000 attempts before finally creating the lightbulb.


