

I showed the hole to God and mused,


"I wonder where my sorrows could be?"

Through the Eyes of Peter Woodin

Gazing down over Oswego County at the churches he started, he's shaking his head. There's Hannibal Community Church merged with Presbyterians, and Fulton also joined them. Caughdenoy is a Methodist town. That church in California, he's not sure what happened there. Smiling, he looks down on the First Baptist Church of Central Square, still a vital part of the community – weathered ups and downs ever since he built it – completed in June 1845. He remembers some of the parishioners, a relative of Marion Chesebro that contributed lumber. Let's see, there have been 30 pastorates including many interim pastors. Two pastors served twice.

There have been many changes, mostly all improvements, keeping that original building looking very good. He's wondering how many descendants of that ministry are attending there now. During D. D. Owens ministry, the first time, the kitchen was added. He served again later for one year. It was while A. E. Knapp ministered as a student that the church had its first ordination. Looks like from 1892 until 1904 is was business as usual with exceptions of 1900 – 1902 when Reverend had a large number of new members. How he's enjoying the stained glass windows and new pews installed during Reverend Weinhouer's ministry. Again, he is wondering how many of this congregation know any of the people the windows memorialize.

Look at that – a new building next door – the new parsonage built by Reverend Russell. He only has to walk next door to church! That ladies auxiliary is busy raising money for God's work. Reverend Rawson's announcing a fair at the grange, probably to help with the remodeled kitchen and redecorated dining room. They thanked Reverend Woodin for the quilt frames he gave. Hear that bell toll! It was recast in 1910, possibly calling attention to the new baptistery just built. Do you hear that new baby cry? Bet that's baby Erwin Flower born when all these things were going on. Thought that light in the parsonage was dim – just got it wired for electricity during Reverend Miller's pastoring. Reverend Shaw is beaming – one of his congregation is being ordained – that's Grace Fuller's relative, Carlos Fuller.

Reverend Baker is a busy guy! He does everything from the preaching business, to gardening, to doing farm work for his

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parishioners in need. A bequest was used to remodel the church parlors and build a garage to replace the stables where the horses were kept during worship. Hey! An electronic clock is now in the sanctuary. It was purchased by the bays class – better to time those sermons the Baker children wiggle through. Now warm hearts and bodies – two new furnaces were installed. The dining room ceiling was raised and the floor lowered. Do you hear the baby cry I bet that's baby Jack baker born in the parsonage.

More new additions during reverend Guckert's ministry - a Christian flag choir loft enlarged, a lightened Cass and blue curtains. Wait a minute this pastor single -who are those people in the parsonage? Ruth and Lowell Gregg are sharing this home until they are settled. Wow! 100 years already! Rev. Clymer is helping out with a grand celebration - certificates are being sold to finance this event. Reverend Baker's first pastorate brought 45 new members and 28 more this time. He's keeping those boys in shape gardening, shoveling, and whatever else he feels they need to be doing.

Do you hear those beautiful sound coming from the church? It's the new organ purchased during Reverend Vanderlinder's pastorate. He is part time but he's doing very well. Reverend Owens came as a full-time pastor and also brought many changes. First Baptist was incorporated, annual meeting change from May to January, the Ladies Auxiliary and Mission Circle merge to become American Baptist Women. There's that fellowship hall renovated again! There are new hymnals in the pews and new robes are hung in the new storage cabinet. Baptisms are warmer with the hot and cold water system.

Mr. Neil Gilmour was the first moderator. George Maunt and Lowell Gregg were deacon emeritus. Two new classes joined Baraca – Philathea – Hearthstone and Fry –C. The Klatz property was purchased for an office, nursery, and classes. New church school curriculum was tested when Rev. Morrison was pastor. A Palm Sunday Community Choir was enjoyed. Bertha Harrington and Ester Codder established the church library. Boy Scout Troop 334 was sponsored by the church – another community outreach.

A study and office were built into the church building. A new organ was given as a memorial. The Iroquois Association was established. Always fresh maple syrup for Easter Breakfast thanks to the Holland's tapping the maples. Rev. Anderson was ordained at First Baptist. This pastor was never bothered by the fire siren because he was a firefighter. See that sanctuary – it's been beautifully refurbished. Another celebration, 140 years! Makes Peter Woodin proud to see how this church has progressed in the good works for God.

The year 1987 was groundbreaking for the additions. In spite of many difficulties, the building proceeded. When Reverend Spencer arrived, it was dedicated in 1991. The "Heart Song" concert drew

As founder of this church, he is very pleased with what he sees that hopes each of you will feel moved to continue God's work by using your gifts in anyway you can to continue the successfulness of our church for many more years. Here's to spreading the good news in Central Square - Oswego County - New York State- United States of America - the world.

From the Reverend

Dear Friends,

This year feels as though it is flying by. "Prepare for Lent," is scribbled on my to do list, larger than anything else I have yet to complete. How does one prepare for the Lenten season?

I am not sure about you, but for me, Lent seems like an awkward season. I have never been confused about where Lent leads to-Easter. Lent is a holy season of the church that begins in the middle of the week, on a Wednesday instead of a Sunday. For most of us, the important seasons in our church life began on Sunday. But Ash Wednesday often sneaks up on me, and if I am not careful, I am behind on the Lenten journey before I know it. Part of the reason for this is that the American Baptist Church in the Midwest does not normally observe Ash Wednesday in any sort of service.

If the date of Easter were not a moving target, Lent might not seem so awkward to navigate. We know that Christmas is going to be on December 25th, but Easter moves around. And because Lent is attached to Easter by forty days, its date also moves around. It's an awkward, seemingly unpredictable point to track. Part of the confusion is that one cannot count backward forty days from Easter and arrive at Ash Wednesday. The early church mothers and fathers designated Sundays as a day for celebration, so Sundays do not count. This is because they wanted those who observe the practice of fasting as part of their Lenten observation to be able to celebrate with their Christian community.


Some Christians begin the Lenten journey with a cross-shaped smudge of ash on their foreheads, if they remember to mark Ash Wednesday on their calendar, that is. Some choose to give up a habit or pleasure as a gesture of penitence. Some of us travel the season of Lent by carefully stepping over it from one Sunday to the next, gathering up curious pieces along the way, and making a final festive leap straight from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday, bypassing Holy Week's difficult and tragic turns. Others of us move more slowly, guided by daily prayers, not missing one single Holy Week station toward the Cross, as brutal as they are for all who dare to love Jesus. The good news for is, no particular Lenten journey is more perfect or right than another. Our journey to Easter is ours and no one else's. No other person can travel there for us, nor can we for them; and yet we will end up at the same destination on Easter morning- outside the walls of Jerusalem! And because we have adjusted our lives a little or a lot to follow Jesus through the ups and downs, the deserts and roads of Lent, we can also count on one other truth that will become when the dust settles: we all will find ourselves at a different place than where we began.

"Make me to know your ways, O Lord; teach me your paths. Lead me in your truth, and teach me, for you are the God of my salvation; for you I wait all day long," (Psalm 25:4-5).
