### To Your Health



If you don't notice anything fishy in your kitchen, it might not hurt to make it that way. Good news about omega-3 fatty acids keeps rolling in. One new study suggests it may help critically ill people by controlling inflammation. And another shows that it may help stave off age-related diseases.

Omega-3's are found in fish (especially salmon, herring, anchovies, pollock, and sardines), walnuts, flax, kiwifruit, eggs, organic cheese and milk, black raspberries, among other foods.

Add these benefits to the results of other studies which indicate that diets rich in omega-3's also result in significantly improved cardiovascular health, reduced inflammation for rheumatoid arthritis sufferers, a more effective immune system, and overall brain health.

#### United Mission

Many of you may not be aware that the funding for our ABC / NYS region office and its functions mostly comes from what is called United Mission. United Mission is used to fund almost all works of ministry done on our behalf by ABC / USA, which includes our region support office.

But there has been several things happen that has dramatically impacted the monies directed toward United Mission. The most obvious is that state of our economy. As people lose income, the amount of their tithe also decreases. This is no surprise.

But what may be surprising is that as churches and individuals commit financial support directly towards a specific missionary, the amount they contribute to United Mission declines. The hope was that direct support of missionaries would be an "over and above" offering.

As a result, all ABC ministry work is being impacted, including our region office. Much of what ABC / NYS does is behind the scenes, such as field ministers that support our Pastors and associations, co-ordination of missionary furlough visits and the administration of the ordination process. Others are highly visible on occasion, such as providing staff services for search committees and assistance in resolving church conflicts.

Then there are the on-going activities of Outdoor Ministries, Mission Advocates and Ministers Retreat, and on-going resourcing of pastors and churches.
