CPR Training Here



Cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training is something we may hope to never need to use, but it's also something we don't want to be without if and when the need for it does arise.

One of our own, SOVAC member Randi Driesen, is heading up a training seesion to be conducted in our Fellowship Hall and classrooms on Saturday, February 19th from 9:00 to 1:00. The program of instruction, called Family and Friends, is intended to teach people how to give CPR to an adult, child, or infant. It will also cover emergency actions to take when either an adult, a child, or an infant is choking and provide instruction on the use of the automated external defibrillation devices (AED) that have become common in public places.

Please contact the church office not later than Monday, February 14th to register so the appropriate materials will be available for you. Although the cost for the course is \$10, nobody will be turned away. Please speak with Pastor Bud if you would like access to scholarship funds.

To Your Health



To paraphrase William Shakespeare, "To sleep or not to sleep; that is the question." Pulling an allnighter, whether as a college student cramming for an exam, or for a Three Stooges afficianado watching a film fest of that trio of tricksters, there's and energy price to pay.

It may seem like a good thing, because a person will burn about 150 more calories by missing that night's sleep than if they were snoozing. But, during the 'make-up' time, fewer calories are burned as the body tries to recover what it lost.

Even more important is that the intent for the energy that is readily available at night is believed to be used "to fuel essential sleep functions such as rewiring connections between brain cells, boosting the immune system and regulating hormones ..." Those functions are essential for good health, so it's really not worth it.

The same deficits probably exist for those who suffer from sleep apnea and chronic insomnia.
